ST HELENA GENERAL ELECTION

His Excellency the Governor in a radio interview on 17 May advised that he intended to dissolve Legislative Council on 18 May and declare a General Election on Wednesday, 27 June. This has now been done. Plans are therefore in progress to prepare for the General Election on 27 June - that is the date when a new Government will be chosen to serve you for the next four years or so. As you have heard via radio, the Writs will be issued by His Excellency the Governor on Thursday, 31 May to the Returning Officer to conduct the Election. Nomination Days have been set as follows:

Monday, 11 June: Blue Hill, Sandy Bay and Alarm Forest Tuesday, 12 June: Longwood, Levelwood and Half Tree Hollow Wednesday, 13 June: St Paul's and Jamestown

The venue for receipt of Nomination Forms are: for Blue Hill at the Blue Hill Community Centre; for Sandy Bay at the Sandy Bay Community Centre; for Alarm Forest at the Alarm Forest Police Station; for Longwood at the Harford Community Centre; Levelwood at the Levelwood Community Centre; for HTH at the HTH Community Centre; for St Paul's at the Kingshurst Community Centre and for Jamestown at the Jamestown Community Centre. In each of these places nominations will be received between 10 am and 12 noon and may be handed in either by the candidate, his/her proposer or seconder. It is advisable to hand in Nomination Forms as soon as possible after 10 am. This will ensure that if there are any corrections to be made, there is time to make them before the nomination period closes at 12 noon. Any person wishing to stand must be 21 years or over and their names must be on the 2001 Registers of Electors. These Registers are posted on all notice boards around the Island, as well as in Community Centres, Solomons shops at Half Tree Hollow, Sandy Bay, Longwood and Levelwood,- the Police Stations at HTH, White Gate, Longwood and Alarm Forest, Scotland Office, Head O'Wain Clinic, Mrs Audrey Yon's shop at Blue Hill, the Public Library and the Office of the Chief Secretary. The Nomination Form is simple to fill in. There has to be a proposer, a seconder and at least five supporters, all of whom must be on the 2001 Registers of Electors. A candidate need not be registered in the particular area he or she proposes to stand: it can be anywhere on the Island provided his/ her name is on the 2001 Registers. However, the proposer, seconder

and supporters must all be registered electors in the area for which the candidate is nominated. Each Nomination Form must be accompanied by the candidate's written consent to stand for election. The signatures of the proposer and seconder must be witnessed by a Justice of the Peace, but the signatures of the supporters can be witnessed by anyone. Nomination Forms can be obtained from: The News Media Office, Broadway House, Jamestown Spar, HTH Spar, Community Centres around the Island. Mrs Doris Yon's shop at New Ground, Mrs Audrey Yon's shop at Blue Hill, Thorpes and Solomons shops at Sandy Bay, Solomons Supermarket at Longwood, Alarm Forest Police Station and from the Returning Officer, Ethel Yon and Assistant Returning Officers Patricia Andrews and Jackie Lawrence at the Office of the Chief Secretary. If any help is required, please contact the Returning Officer or her Assistants. They will be very pleased to give whatever help is required. The ball is in your court so choose the people you want to represent you on Legislative Council. The decision is yours. Listen to your local radio station and read your local newspaper to keep you fully informed. ACT NOW TO CHOOSE YOUR CANDIDATE.

The evaluation of tenders for the RMS Ship Management Contract and the RMS Passenger Agency Contract carried out by St Helena Line, is now complete. It has been agreed that both contracts are to be awarded to Andrew Weir Shipping Limited, Andrew Weir Shipping is a long established, privately owned shipping company with an excellent reputation. They have a great deal of experience in operating throughout the world, including serving small islands. Notably, they have strong links with the Iberian Peninsular (Spain and Portugal) and with South Africa, and they operate a monthly round-the-world service, which could deviate to Cape Town and St Helena if the need arose. They have a dedicated passenger department with an on-line passenger booking and management system, and have identified all experienced passenger shipping manager who will be appointed to manage the St Helena passenger service. AWSL have a comprehensive wed site at: www.aws.co.uk . The transition between Curnow Shipping Ltd and Andrew Weir Shipping Ltd for the running of the RMS will be kept as smooth as possible, and there is a provision in the Ship Management Contract for retention of all St Helenians employed on the RMS, It is considered to be advantageous to have both contracts awarded to the same company. However, it should be stressed that AWSL were considered the preferred tender for both contracts independently. St Helena Line will now finalise negotiations with Andrew Weir Shipping on the two contracts, taking note of a number of pertinent issues raised by the Governor.

"Trouble in Tristan" By Garron Yon

Heavy winds have caused considerable damage in Tristan da Cunha. The incident occurred on Wednesday 23 May and St Helena Herald learnt of the disaster on Friday of that week. The 120mph winds destroyed a quarter of the hospital including the theatre and x-ray machine and caused some houses to lose their roofs. The Prince Phillip Community Hall is said to have been "seriously damaged." The winds took out electricity and communications, and Mr Glass, Chief Islander said it would be at least a week before communications are restored, although he expected electricity to be restored within three hours of the incident. The Islanders were unable to receive incoming calls or send and receive e-mails. Mr Glass said that he may have to put in a bid for funding to replace their satellite phone and x-ray machine. He feels that once the damage has been fully assessed, there might be the need to have other items replaced. The

In His Excellency's view, this is an appropriate source of funding since there is only £600,000,00 in the present three-year aid agreement. This money is mainly for technical cooperation within the Island. A South African crewed ship the Kelso, has left Cape Town for Tristan with roofing materials. Tristan is St Helena's smallest sister Island and it was only in October of 1961 that all of the inhabitants had to be evacuated to the UK because of a volcanic eruption. The Island was discovered in 1506 by the Portuguese navigator Admiral Tristan da Cunha, although no one landed until 137 years later. St Helena Herald has tried to contact the Tristan Administrator but has been unsuccessful due to their communication

ACTIVITY REPORT

Last week the Police Department dealt with 23 reports. Late on Friday night two arrests were made in separate incidents. Sebastian Stroud of New Ground was arrested for assault occasioning actual bodily harm following a fight at the Oasis tavern in Half Tree Hollow. Jeremy Henry of Clay Gut was arrested for causing a Breach of the Peace at his family home. Both persons appeared before Magistrates on Saturday morning and were released from custody on conditional bail. They will return to Court on 7 June. On Saturday night two incidents occurred in licensed premises in Jamestown; one at the White Horse Bar and the other at the Consulate Bar; in both incidents persons were injured though not seriously. Both cases are now under Police investigation. The Police are concerned about outbreaks of fighting on licensed premises and are working closely with licensees to try and prevent this type of incident from happening. There was a burglary in the Half Way area, when a TOSHIBA Laptop computer was stolen from a dwelling. The Police would remind the public that they should ensure that ALL doors and windows are locked and secured when they leave their homes regardless of how long they expect to be absent. It only takes moments for a sneak thief to do their work and escape with valuables, which may well be of more personal worth to you than themselves. Two persons were stopped and searched for suspected possession of Cannabis as a result of a phone call from an informant. No illegal drugs were found, however the Police would like to thank the persons concerned. There were two minor road traffic accidents. In one case a car was allegedly hit whilst parked at the Seafront. The other occurred at Grapevine Gut on Sunday afternoon. Other reports were of a minor nature and were dealt with appropriately.

MAGISTRATES COURT – 24th May 2001

Ian Douglas Sim of Ladder Hill appeared before magistrates charged with consuming intoxicating liquor whilst on a Restriction Order, he pleaded guilty and was sentenced to two months imprisonment suspended for 12 months. He was represented by Mr Colin Forbes, Public Solicitor.

Timothy James Ellick of Sunnyside was charged with Assault Occasioning Actual Bodily Harm. He pleaded guilty and was fined £40 plus £5 costs. Mr Ellick was not represented.

Mervyn George Crowie of Teale's Cottage, Jamestown was charged with being found drunk in a public place, he pleaded guilty and was fined £15 plus £5 costs. Mr Colin Forbes, Public Solicitor, represented him. Magistrates presiding were: Mr H B Legg, OBE, Mr A E D Clarke, MBE and Mr S A Stroud.

The Battle of the Papers - Part 1

News has always been important, even on a small Island such as St Helena. The St Helena News Media distributes some 1400 newspapers each week and is widely received via the Internet with some 20, 000 hits to date. For many people - news has become an essential part of their daily diet, and the British Government has stated that there is a need for a free press on St Helena. Today will mark yet another event in history, since we have now become the St Helena Herald. One might almost say: "going back to our roots" because 1853 saw the first publication of the St Helena Herald by Thomas Dick of Market Street, Jamestown. In this new series, St Helena Herald will take a trip down memory lane, finding out about all newspapers that were published on St Helena. The earliest newspaper held at the St Helena Archives is the St Helena Advocate, first published in May of 1851, the year when the first "free" press was imported to the Island. It is said that "Its introduction was hailed with a joy that was almost delirious," At the time, the Advocate catered for a population of 6000 people. The proprietors felt that

t h e Islanders were not used to freedom of expression or opinion, a n d therefore, t h e y wanted to: "a w a k e n and rouse



[them] to a proper consideration of public affairs – to form a public opinion and to make [their] voice heard." The paper published various information including an article on the Great Exhibition of that year, court proceedings and at first, many letters to the Editor. However, it was short lived, eventually having to close down in January 1853. The *Advocate* had been set up by

Governor Gibb, but those running the paper had started to criticise him. He therefore introduced the new: St Helena Chronicle (first published in 1852). which e v e n t u a l l y succeeded in the pushing

Advocate out of business. Yet even this paper was short lived. By 17 February 1853 the Herald was making the bold statement to: "think as we choose, to write as we choose, to admit into the paper what we choose, and to reject what we choose." The Herald firmly stated: "We will be responsible to nobody." Reference: St Helena Newspapers and St Helena 1502 – 1938 by Philip Gosse.



Reclaimed land and new wharf

To maximise the benefit of the breakwater, we need space to off-load cargo and passengers and park our cars. James Bay with its relatively shallow waters and bottom consisting of sand, would be ideal for a large landfill operation. ST HELENA NATIONAL TRUST UPDATE NO. 3

Proposals to develop a National Trust on Saint Helena are continuing. A Steering Committee comprises representatives of voluntary organisations which have an interest in:

- the conservation of the natural and built environment
- the preservation of Saint Helena's artistic and cultural heritage

These organisations are the Heritage Society, Nature Conservation Group, Dive Club, Tourism Association, Farmers Association, Arts & Craft Group, Millennium Forest Committee and Sandy Bay Environmental Centre. SHG is also a key stakeholder represented by officers from the Environment Planning & Development Section and Physical Planning. Currently the Committee is concentrating on preparing the groundwork necessary to set up the Trust as a formal

straight from the sea. Except for the blasting of rock, which has to be done with care, the operation is not complicated. The over 12 acres of new land could give place for welcomed improvements -Marina, Passenger Slip-way, terminal and safe Customs facilities.

Road to Rupert's and Longwood

A Coastal Road to Rupert's Valley is not a new idea. Several routes are possible. In the sketch we have used the existing lower path to Rupert's as the proposed track when machinery and workforce already have access to the site of construction. The road would start from where the Jubilee Coldstore is today. continue around Mundens Hill, behind Argos and the Fisheries in Ruperts and end opposite St Michael's Church. The massive amounts of rock taken from the construction of the coastal road will be the welcome for construction of the breakwater and the landfill in James Bay. From Rupert's Valley, a new road mainly following the old "Boer Road" to Deadwood could be constructed. This is an old idea, which surprisingly has not materialised when the building of such a road would not be complicated nor excessively expensive. These two road projects would cut the distance from Longwood to Jamestown considerably and cut the travelling time by well over

half. If a future airport comes true, the benefit would be even larger. The Coastal Road would make it possible to move containers and cargo from Jamestown to Rupert's for storage

if necessary and give the possibility to develop Rupert's Valley into the industrial site as planned for several years.

Who would build and who would pay?

Large projects cost money, no doubt, but the money can be used to work for the Island. There are no reasons why local labour and skills cannot be used. There will be a need for maybe two or three experienced engineers and some initial training for Saints provided by ex-pats but the Island could manage the rest of the project. No accurate costing of the entire plan has been made but qualified guesses indicate a round figure of £10 million. A major share of the money would stay on the Island and boost the economy over the three years the construction would take. Finance from both local sources and aid organisations would be possible when the projects can be seen as economically beneficial and sustainable.

Consequences and Benefits

Some will say that Jamestown will lose some of its charm and Georgian style from the development of the Wharf. This does not have to be entirely true. By moving car-parks to the new Wharf, development of Jamestown for tourism purposes can take off. The outdoor cafes and restaurants, suggested by some, are given space in the Grand Parade and in Main Street. It would even be possible to convert Jamestown into a conservation area if we so wished. All the modern facilities not suitable in town have enough space outside the Arch or in Rupert's Valley. The current Wharf area is neither from an aesthetic nor a safety point of view suitable for tourism and safe, efficient cargo handling facilities are also non existent at the moment. The rock-fall on Easter Monday and the more recent controlled clearing of rocks in the Wharf area proved the unsuitability of the location. Our workmen, our people and potential tourists are taking unacceptable risks being at the Wharf. The proposed plans would make it possible to terrace the hillside and use the masses for landfill. Previous ideas of creating a free harbour and a non-tax development area on the Island would be possible. The spin off effects, both during the construction and for the future of St Helena would be enormous. Combined with an airport, the Island would be well on the way to prosperity.

EXTRACTS FROM THE LOG — THE FIRST MARENGO

This series of short articles are based on data and comments from my logbooks. They cover a period from 1971 to October 2000. Entries in the Yacht's log books are only the bare bones of day-to-day events in the course of a voyage. My comments will "flesh out" this sparse information. This, the first of these articles goes back to 1972. The log reads -1400 hours, August 26 1972. Vessel moving sluggishly towards the coast of Brazil. Wind easterly, Force 3. Sea slight. All aboard hoping that this will be the last day of this long drawn out passage. My wife, myself and two young children had expected to take about three weeks from St Vincent, Cape Verde Islands to Salvador, Brazil. However, protracted doldrums and the growth of a huge crop of goose barnacles had dragged the voyage out to 39 days. Some two hours later, straining my eyes peering ahead, I saw something. Out with the Ross 7 x 50 binoculars. Yes, dancing in the haze off the starboard bow I made out the slender fingers of the skyscrapers of the City of Salvador. LAND HO. What a landfall, what a triumph. I have crossed this ocean many times since, but this landfall will remain in my mind forever.

New Era

Radio St. Helena opens up a new chapter this evening when our local programmes conclude at 2200 hrs. As Station Manager, I am pleased to publicly announce with the greatest of pleasure that my long awaited dream has come true. Radio St. Helena will be transmitting over twenty-four hours, including weekends. We will be switching over to the BBC World Service from the close of our local programmes at 2200 hrs today. This has come about as a result of a plea to the BBC for a better service to the South Atlantic Island of St. Helena as reception of their shortwave transmission to this part of the world has been appalling for many years. Radio St. Helena has been re-broadcasting the BBC World Service at intervals from as far back as 1977 by way of our Medium Wave Service. We were constantly apologising for the very poor reception that we were receiving from the BBC World Service, and there were times when we had no alternative but to abandon the BBC altogether because the reception was lost completely, especially during the summer months. I am pleased to say that we now hope to give our listeners the highest quality reception possible in this part of the world from the BBC World Service. I complained continually to the Atlantic Relay Station on Ascension Island, and asked if there was anything they could possibly do to help us with our reception problems. The answer was no, because we were off the footprint of their transmission and there was nothing they could do. I was in Britain for a short period of time in July 2000, and I visited the BBC World Service where I made my case known to them in person about the reception in St. Helena, and again they said that it would be a very expensive operation to better the reception in this area of the world. I came away very disappointed, but at least I was able to explain and complain personally. A few months later, I spoke to Mr Chris Turton, an Engineer working for Merlin International, the Company that operates the BBC Atlantic Relay Station on Ascension, who directed me to Paul Barton at the BBC in London. Again, I told my story and waited. At long last, I received a favourable reply to the effect that after hard discussions, the BBC had agreed that they would grant Radio St. Helena a Satellite Dish receiver to re-broadcast the BBC World Service programmes as we feel fit. This was good news, and I then made enquiries as to what was the next step. Discussion continued on the subject here on St. Helena, on Ascension Island and in London. After many weeks of waiting for a definite reply as to when we could expect the arrival of equipment on St. Helena, I was saddened to learn that the BBC found the cost of supplying and setting up such equipment for St. Helena to be far too expensive. They had to abandon the idea. I felt it was important to follow up this proposal, and I sought an appointment with His Excellency the Governor and explained the situation to him. He made contact with the BBC Headquarters and we waited for a reply. Within a few days we received an answer saying that it had been approved and the equipment would be released to us free, but the setting up and technical charges would have to be borne by the Media Services. It took us some weeks to get the 5.9 metre dish in place and tests commenced. It was a tremendous moment when we contacted BBC in London and told

The plaques were a gift to the island from Nick Cole who over several years, along with ex-Chief & Stedson, spent nearly lay every weekend carefully retracing many of these ancient paths, some of which had fallen into ruin being underused. I went on most of those walks for the sheer adventure and occasional adrenaline rush when we had to traverse a tricky bit or swing on the odd rope, but very soon I learned of the real risks these fishermen (and sometimes women came along too) had to take in order to obtain the free and plentiful protein from the sea. I might have sturdy walking boots and

new climbing rope but often these fishermen had no special boots (if any) or equipment and in addition, had to carry lamps and fishing gear; on the way back they had to carry the fish along the same treacherous paths in the dark. Part of this islands heritage is of the courage of these fishermen whose names and stories occasionally name the places on the rocks where the paths lead, such as Tom Green where we laid the plaque on Saturday, Jimmy's Flat and Ben Millet. Nick Cole couldn't return to the island to do this task but with Stedson's help we have Engineer John Jacobson laid some of the plaques and I know he will the rest I leave. Nick Cole did, however, manage to write up some of the walks and these will be printed and put on sale in the tourist office. Although not for anyone unfit or less than stout hearted, it would be great to think that folk will still be able to follow these paths and gain some insight into the courage of those fishermen and their place in the islands heritage. I would hate to think that in years to come we lose both the paths and their stories and indeed, some of the stories are tragic. If anyone can recount a story that has helped to name a fishing place on the rocks around the island it would help preserve that history by sending it in to the St Helena News letters page. Perhaps we can collect them together and print them in time for 2002 celebrations.







NOTICE By now everyone should he aware of the BSE, commonly known as the Mad Cow Disease, and the outbreak of the most recent Foot and

Mouth Disease. Because of this it is highly unlikely that there will be any importation of, animals/animal semen in the near future. Therefore, it is advisable for all farmers/owners

to maintain their registered male breeding animals for the Island's use, and to try their utmost in keeping them to a fairly good standard. On the other hand, it is felt that there are still some male animals on the Island, which





registered. For those of you who are not aware of the registered age, here is a reminder:

A stallion donkey that has attained the age of 24 months

A bull that has attained the age of 6 months A ram that has attained the age of 3 months

An un-castrated male goat that has attained the age of 3 months A boar that has attained the age of 6 months

Whether you wish to keep the animal for breeding or slaughter, it should still be registered. The procedure is very simple. The first thing to do is to obtain a form from the Livestock Section, complete it and then return it to the Department at a negotiated time of convenience. Your animal will be assessed after which time a permit will be



sent to you. The Livestock Section is aware of registered male animals that are intended for improving our current stock, so to those of you who would like to improve your livestock, please help us to help you.
