# Governor's visit to the UK April/ May - Good news for St Helena

At an informal meeting of Legislative Council held on Thursday, 17 May, His Excellency the Governor gave a brief report on his recent visit to the UK when, in the margins of the Governors' Conference which took place from 2 - 4 May, he was able to discuss a number of issues that are pertinent to the economic development of St Helena. The first meeting in the UK was with St Helena Line (SHL) to discuss the tender process for the future management of the RMS St Helena passenger and ship operation contracts. Whilst the UK Serious Fraud Office was conducting an investigation into Curnow Shipping Ltd, Governor Hollamby had agreed with SHL that Curnow's tenders would continue to be considered on their own merits. However, in the event of one or both contracts being awarded to Curnow, it would be subject to the inclusion of a suitable caveat, which would provide for the withdrawal of the contract(s) should Curnow be found guilty of any offence. It was hoped that the outcome of the tender process would be known by the end of May. In meeting with FCO officials including the new Director of the Americas, the Resource Management Officer and the Deputy Head of the Overseas Territories Department, the Governor was able to obtain approval in principle for a number of projects that had previously been forwarded to the FCO by the Office of the Chief Secretary. Good Government Funding was obtained for support for the local police force to finance a two-year appointment of an expatriate Assistant Superintendent of Police following ASP Derek Thomas' promotion to Chief of Police later this year. Whilst ASP Thomas had been identified to succeed the current expatriate Chief of Police, Royce Hipgrave, no one had been identified to fill the number two position. Funding was also agreed in principle from the new FCO Economic Diversification Fund to set up a Companies Registry office in St Helena. The absence of a Companies Registry office has denied local business the benefits of corporate status and limited liability. It is an impediment to the development of the economy. It will aid inward investment in that investors will be able to register Ascension Island will now be able to attend the biennial Island Games to be held in the Isle of Man in July this year. An application for funding in the sum of £18,000 had been sent to the FCO in April this year. His continued protection and well being of the tortoises replace the metal fencing around Plantation lawn. Moving away from FCO-funded projects, Governor Hollamby met with DFID officials and Joe Terry from SHELCO, who was accompanied by the Deputy Chairman of a leading architectural and engineering firm "OVE ARUP" who had joined forces with SHELCO. The meeting was positive with "OVE ARUP" explaining that they would be in a position to offer a Public Private Partnership and help to raise the balance of monies that would be needed for an airport over an above that which DFID would provide for the least cost access option i.e. either sea or air access. The meeting was however, unable to discuss the findings of the High-Point Rendel air/sea access study since the report had not been finalised. The Governor's Conference covered a number of issues

We are ready to take on the responsibility of controlling our destiny in a more positive manner. We have done it in the past and I see no reason why it should not be the case in the future. Having said all that the situation looks a bit more hopeful as far as communication is concerned and I think this is the value of the Governor's attendance at such meetings. Although we can never appear to be 100% happy with what is happening I think we have to accept that no matter how slowly things move - at least they are moving. What we need to make sure of is that our next Council is a strong one and only we as voters can ensure this. We cannot choose our Governor, our Chief Secretary or our Financial Secretary but we can choose our local leaders - the ones we often blame for the perceived inadequacies of our Government. The 27 June is not far away and it is our moral responsibility to go to the Polls and vote with our conscience for the best possible outcome, which

# Dear Editor,

I find myself going back in time in reading your St. Helena News dated 9th March 2001, and I refer to page 9 of that issue and the item 'PEST WATCH'. The author commented on the produced locally peaches."It has been encouraging to see the amount of local peaches available this season. Not only were peaches presented as gifts between households, but were also for sale on the local market. Approximately 25kgs were reported to have been sold through one particular outlet." The author goes on to say that the peaches were tastier than imported peaches. Rightly so but I must disagree with the statement that reads. "The objective of the Integrated Pest

increase production of fruit and imports." I find this rather misleading as it would appear that through the Integrated Pest Management Project, where many thousands of pounds had been spent in an endeavour to try and eradicate the Mediterranean Fruit Fly that failed, we now have perfect local peaches. The statement is untrue. I speak from experience. When the Integrated Pest Management Programme was well established, and I received an IPM visit. I was asked not to spray with Lebaycid Liquid because the IPM team would like to experiment with some special Fruit Fly Bate on my peach and plum trees. I went along with their idea and left this part of the fruit tree management to them. In previous years, I have always had an abundance of good tasty plums and peaches, and I thought that after the new experiments I would have a good crop, (maggot free) without having spray.This would he wonderful I thought. be harvested, not even to give away, as the whole crop of fruit was heavily infested after being stung by the Mediterranean Fruit Fly. No one from the IPM team ever came back to check or even ask about the crop quality. therefore reverted to my old method. Mulching, pruning, manure and placing drip irrigation on each tree from Spring to the end of the fruit season. After blossoming of both the peach and plum trees I took my empty five gallon tin, stuffed it with dry grass, made a few holes in the side, set it alight and placed it under each tree for an

I had a job earlier this year but was only getting 50p per hour whereas when I was in the UK doing some part-time work I was getting £4 per hour. I think the pay that some people get is very ridiculous. What if they were living on their own? How are they supposed to cope? So far, I've been turned down for at least 12 jobs and I think it is ridiculous, as I've got my grades from when I was in England but no one here will accept them. All of the hard work I did in England was for nothing and it's a shame that I have to waste my life sitting in the house all day, every day. When someone comes from overseas they get a job straight away. A lady came from the Falklands not so long ago and had a job a few days later down at the Castle. Another woman came from Ascension by the last ship and the Social Services kept phoning her to find out if she wanted a job there. A young man came from the UK and was offered a job at the Jamestown Spar. Even though these people might have experience or whatever they should still have to go through the same procedures everyone else. I know for sure that there were no interviews going on for these jobs' as they weren't even advertised. I've been trying for six months to actually get a job but have been totally unsuccessful. There is too much favouritism going on on this Island and I know that it's not only me that has a problem.

The Police Department dealt with 20 reports last week. Four arrests were made in separate incidents. On Tuesday, 15 May at about 8.20pm a male from Jamestown was arrested for being found drunk in a public place, he was charged with the offence and bailed to appear before Magistrates on Thursday, 24 May. On Thursday, 17 May two males from the Briars were arrested for fighting; one of them was admitted to hospital to have his injuries treated. Both men were charged with being in possession of an offensive weapon for an unlawful purpose and one was also charged with assault occasioning actual bodily harm. A resident in the Red Hill, Levelwood area, who was at home alone at about 3.00am on Saturday morning heard someone attempting to gain entry to his home.

He quickly left the house and went to the home of a nearby friend where he alerted the police by phone. He returned with the Police and found the intruder crouching by his bed. The man was arrested on reasonable suspicion of burglary and charged with burglary. He was later released on bail to appear before Magistrates on 31 May. In the early hours of Sunday morning a beige Ford Fiesta, registration number 129, was parked in Barracks Square. The occupants had gone to Dillon's Bar for no longer than an hour. During their absence some unknown person or persons went to the car and removed a ladies black sling bag containing £450. The Police would like to remind the public that St Helena is not a crime free society and they urge everyone to make every effort to ensure that that their valuables and property are properly secure. Another burglary took place at the residence of Mr Tom Crowards at Red Hill. On returning to his home he discovered a burglar leaving the house. He pursued the man who is approximately 5ft 10in in height and of a fair complexion. The man got away with a black rucksack, a wallet containing some credit

cards and £10 in cash as well as a plate with some food on it. The incident was reported to the Police but as yet the burglar is still at large. There was a theft of two fishing rods with reels in the Longwood area. One minor Road Traffic Accident was reported and there were 10 requests for police assistance. The Police department is pleased to note that the celebrations on Francis Plain on Sunday and St Helena Day in Jamestown were a success and went off without incidents.

investment and no tourist industry given the limited passenger capacity on the RMS St Helena. With an ageing population and no economic growth, St Helena would be in a continuous need for aid. Vision was needed to fund an alternative economic development model for St Helena and move us away from dependency. Air access could lead to this. Discussions on human rights issues covered domestic violence. women's rights and child abuse. Governor Hollamby was able to brief the meeting on the implementation recommendations made by DFID Social Adviser, Stephen Kidd. Mr Kidd was in attendance and was able to confirm that St Helena was miles ahead of other Overseas Territories where there was a high rate of crime including child abuse and domestic violence. Governor Hollamby was also pleased to report that Baroness Scotland, who was a qualified Barrister in family/social matters, had offered to give free advice the Overseas Territories. Finally, the conference noted that the Environmental Charter had been sent to all Overseas Territories for comments with a view to obtaining agreement for all territories to adopt the Charter at the next Territories Overseas Consultative Council meeting later this year. On-island consultation regarding the content of the draft is being led by the Environmental Coordinator, Miss Isabel Peters. In concluding his report to Legislative Council, Governor Hollamby commented that the Governors Conference was very good and that overall his visit to the UK was most useful and beneficial to St Helena. # From the Fire & Rescue Service





It has been another busy week for the Fire and Rescue Service and whilst we look back on a successful rock r e m o v a l operation carried out by the Public

Works and Service Department, we also reflect on the tragic loss of life at Manatee Bay and offer sincere condolences to the families of those involved. Everyone will know by now, through radio reports that two fishermen, Glen Beard and Herman Peters did not return from fishing last Wednesday afternoon. The Sea Rescue Services were mobilised after being alerted that evening, and whilst following investigations we were certain that the two had gone fishing in the area, sea conditions that evening prevented any land or underwater searches being carried out. The Rescue team were dispatched on Thursday morning, including a land search team of ANRD workmen, members of the emergency services and members of the public, however, sea conditions were such in Old Wife Cove, that a complete search of the fishing rocks was unable to be carried out, until Barry Benjamin of Harpers was collected from one side of the cove and landed on the other. After searching, he found clues, which led us to believe that Glen and Herman had been fishing in the area known as Rainy Rocks. Divers were committed to the water and located and retrieved the body of Herman Peters at the entrance to a cove. Repeated searches were carried out, but unfortunately the body of Glen Beard could not be located. Over the following few days, sea conditions deteriorated, but divers searched the entire area across the front of Manatee Bay and Devils Hole. Saturday's sea conditions were very bad, and this continued into Sunday and Monday, although a surface search and a deep dive was made on Sunday. Sea conditions improved on Tuesday, although not good enough to allow divers to search the area directly in front of the area known as The Waterfall. A further search was made on Wednesday, but again sea conditions were unfavourable. At the time of writing this report, it is planned to visit the area and carry out a surface search on Thursday 24 May. Thanks must be extended to all who helped in some way or the other, especially to those members of the public who helped with the land search, both on the evening the report was received and the ensuing days. This was the first rescue operation of its kind to take place under my command and I found good interaction between the Rescue Service, the Divers and other emergency services, there was co operation in all areas and whilst there were points we improved upon, resulting from debriefs of the previous rescue, I am sure there will be points to improve on from this occasion. A successful operation at the end of the week was the controlled rock fall by the Public Works and Services Department last Friday. Rock Guards had identified an outcrop of rock above the Wharf in Jamestown. From the pictures you can see the quantities of rock and the damage caused. However, it is quite obvious that it was a very good move to bring the rock down in a controlled manner as the damage can be repaired, had the rocks fallen on their own, there could have been serious consequences. The operation gave our section and the Public Works and Services Department to work together, using newly acquired skills and equipment.



There has been a noticeable change in peoples buying habits over the last 10 years. The Statistics Office, of the Development and Economic Planning Department conducts a 'shopping basket' survey every three months to note any changes in prices. The 'Shopping basket' contains 160 goods and services that range from corn flakes to payment for electricity bills. The section also conducts a Household Expenditure Survey, which shows what type of items people are buying. A survey of this type is also conducted in the UK and from their recent results it was noted that people are buying different things. It seems as though this is also becoming the case on St Helena. St Helena News spoke to Tracey Thomas, Statistics Officer who has recently been involved in supervising the household expenditure survey that took place in July and August of last year. They will be able to provide the results in June of this year. Response to the survey was good. During previous surveys the section often came across the problem of people not recording everything they consume which made it necessary to adjust results to match items that are being imported. Otherwise, there would have been

being imported to the Island on a regular basis, but not being consumed. Whilst analysis of the data has not yet been completed, Tracey feels that some items will have changed since the last survey that was conducted in 1994. She says that there has been the introduction of television fees and an increase in water charges both of which will appear as prominent figures on peoples expense lists. Besides this, the section has also noted that peoples general purchases have also changed. For example more people are buying cooking oil as opposed to lard. St Helena News also went to several shops to find if there has been any notable change in what people have been buying during the last 10 years. Generally, all shops noticed the same types of change. People are far keener to buy pastas and quick foods. In fact, one person said that to an extent, many have now substituted pasta


for rice. The loose tea has been replaced by tea bags and most people now buy tub margarine as opposed to the packets of Echo. There has also been a noticeable concern from shoppers when it comes to expiry dates, with no one wanting to buy food which is outdated. Many people have also become more health conscious and are buying low fat and sugar free foods. Besides food, it has even been noticed that in recent years, people are becoming more particular when it comes to the types of shampoos and facial creams they buy. Generally, shopkeepers feel that people are very keen to try any new foods or products, and they will naturally ensure that they are ordering the stocks which people want to buy.



Much of the Island's natural history; its plants, animals, fossil deposits and dramatic geological features as well as the built heritage such as military batteries, can only be found by exploring the Island on foot. Using footpaths helps to preserve access to this and to some of the most dramatic and beautiful parts of the island. During Environmental Awareness Year (between October 1998- September 1999) the St Helena Nature Conservation Group (SNCG) led 21 guided walks to raise awareness of our Island environment. Some of the places visited included Great Stone Top, Shark's Valley, The Barn, Prosperous Bay, Sugar Loaf & Thompson's Valley. We intend to establish these walks as 'post box walks'. We are also planning to produce a booklet describing the walks in which stamps, available at each destination, can be used to mark the books against the walk completed. Keen walkers will have already noticed that most of the post boxes, which were donated by the ANRD, have been put in place but are all still empty. We are still working on designing the stamps and Solomon and Company have kindly agreed to provide the stamps. Tom Crowards is busy

writing up the description of the walks. We are aware that many of the paths are in need of attention. Inland paths are often overgrown and coastal paths are subject to erosion. In addition many of the paths are difficult to find or follow because they are not clearly marked out on the ground. To reverse the deterioration of many of these walks the SNCG has started an improvement programme. Once a month volunteers will be encouraged to come along and help improve the quality of different footpaths. The first such walk was held on Sunday 6th May to Lot's Wife's Ponds. Ten keen walkers armed with picks, shovels and a rope worked hard to mark the route by building cairns (stones piled together in a conical shape); clear stones from parts of the path and, widen the path in those places where it had collapsed or was difficult to traverse. A section of rope was also added, supplementing the existing rope, to help make

the descent to the ponds a bit safer. The walk was rewarding, everyone pitched in and helped the pickaxe workers did an excellent job - the improvements obvious, the weather was fine and the company friendly and jovial. Well done and thanks. The next walk will be to High Hill on Sunday 3rd June, commencing at 10 am. We hope people will come along and join in. Help to make a difference.

Topic Two: Care for a new puppy.



Having decided that you are going to purchase a puppy, you should make several preparations. A puppy will need a safe, enclosed area where it can play. It will also need somewhere warm to sleep. A puppy should not leave its mother before the age of six to eight weeks. When collecting your puppy, it is a good idea to do so in the morning, so you can spend the entire day with it, however, this is not vital. Always find out as much as you can about your puppy from the person you are buying — what is it used to eating? Talk to your puppy a lot, since it is likely to be feeling afraid and insecure. It is a good idea to keep the puppy in your lap on your



journey home, not in a box. The puppy will still be missing its original family, and needs as much comforting as possible. Upon your arrival home, allow the puppy to investigate its new surroundings. Show it where it is to sleep, and if the time is right, give it a meal. A puppy should receive between four and five meals daily. These should consist of milks, meat and even some form of cereal. Puppy food is available with instructions included. Use your puppy's name as often as possible so that he or she will get used to it. If you are keeping your puppy inside the house, start toilet training at once. This is best done by taking the puppy outside after every meal, and whilst this might sound strange, you can use a word, for example "Pee". Whenever your

puppy does release itself on your command, congratulate it. If at any time your puppy starts to rotate itself in circles, this could be an indication that it wants to urinate. Puppies are dewormed and

micro chipped by the RSPCA. Deworming should take place every two weeks until 12 weeks old. Never take your puppy for long walks until he or she has become a junior dog. If your puppy starts to playfully jump up on you, or bite you, then this should be stopped immediately, since the problem could continue when it is an adult dog. Take your puppy by the skin of its neck, place it on the floor with belly facing you and firmly say "NO". Follow this with a gentle tickle of the stomach. Other useful commands which are simple to teach are "Sit" "Stay" "Come" and "Heel" Make plenty of time for your dog since this will result in it respecting, and loving you more. Some people claim that it even prolongs the life of you dog.

# MEDITERRANEAN SLIMEHEAD OFF COURSE. By Johnny Drummond



n Wednesday morning the 16th May at about 11.30am Peter Benjamin, skipper of the Helena Dorothy, was fishing in the vicinity of the Saddle when he hooked a rather exotic fish on one of his ground lines in about 91 fathoms of water. The fish, which is a dirty pink colour was approximately 40-50 cm in length and weighed 3.4kg was fairly ugly and had little in the way of teeth but had some sort of filtration system in its large mouth suggesting that it might live on shrimp or other small sea creatures. It had a set of strange spiky ridges along its belly and large black eyes; the fins were spiny in nature. According to information supplied by the Fisheries Corporation this type of fish is found in the deep waters of all oceans but is found

mainly in the Madeira and the Cape Verde Islands areas. It is not commonly found in St Helena waters. When staff of the Fisheries corporation opened the fish the following day it was discovered that the stomach was empty and that the fish was heavy with roe, but most incredibly the heart was still beating after more than 26 hours out of water. It is amazing to think what is lurking below the surface of the seas that lap our doorstep!




